



Anti Bullying Policy

In our commitment to creating a safe and respectful environment at Kiddies Paradise, we recognize the complex nature of bullying behavior among children of this age. There are various reasons behind this conduct, with immaturity and limited social skills often playing a significant role. Bullies may resort to these actions due to a lack of more mature ways to relate to their peers. It's essential to remember that every child deserves to be treated with respect, feel happy, and stay safe. Bullying is unacceptable, and as an institution, we are dedicated to addressing this issue.



Our approach is informed by Proverbs 22:6, which guides us in training children in the right way. At Kiddies Paradise, we teach our children that when they unintentionally or intentionally hurt a friend, they should take specific steps:

- 1. **Say "I am sorry"**: We emphasize the importance of offering a sincere apology, even though it can sometimes be challenging for both children and adults. By doing so, we are nurturing a generation that understands the significance of forgiveness.
- 2. Give a hug: We encourage positive and respectful physical contact. Children may be asked to share a hug as a way to understand that physical touch should never be hurtful.
- 3. **Use your words**: Expressing emotions can be challenging for some children. We teach them to use words to communicate their feelings and thoughts effectively.
- 4. **Discuss**: We create an open and safe space for children to share what's in their hearts. If something is bothering them, whether it's an issue at home, such as moving or a family loss, they can talk to us about it. We encourage parents to communicate with teachers or principals about any such events in their child's life.







We believe that certain approaches to discipline are ineffective and harmful, and we do not endorse:

- Returning hurtful behavior
- Having a naughty corner or chair
- Victimizing individuals



As parents, here's what you can do:

- Talk to your child: Engage in open conversations to understand their behavior and feelings.
- **Observe for signs of bullying, including interactions with siblings**: Sometimes, early signs can manifest within family dynamics.
- Listen to the teacher and collaborate: Stay receptive to feedback from teachers and fellow parents.
- Distinguish between accidents and intentional acts: Understand the context before taking action.
- Avoid labeling: Name-calling can worsen the situation.
- **Trust the school's anti-bullying policy**: We have developed this policy through years of experience, and we believe it provides the best guidance.
- Pray with your child: Teach them the power of empathy and kindness.
- Equip them with the right responses to bullying: Offer them phrases and behaviors they can use in challenging situations.
- **Teach them to report to an adult**: Encourage them to speak up if they witness or experience bullying.



If bullying persists and our anti-bullying policy is not followed:

- Parents will be notified: Open communication is crucial in addressing the issue.
- **Face-to-face meetings**: A meeting involving the teacher, principal, and managing principal may be arranged.
- Behavior therapy: We might suggest seeking help from a behavior therapist.
- Anger relief counseling: In certain cases, counseling for anger management may be advised.
- **Temporary suspension**: If the behavior poses a danger to others, a short suspension might be imposed.
- **Permanent suspension**: For severe and repeated offenses that endanger the well-being of other learners or staff, permanent suspension from the school may be recommended.
